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## Good morning,

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback regarding the TISA formula. Below are my comments:

- 1. I really like that there are weighted formulas for students who have unique learning needs. Resources and time are two factors that always figure into the equation when trying to find any solution and, in many cases, students with ULN need both. Additional funding will help with these and increase the likelihood of success for students who have ULN.
- 2. Recognizing Ready Graduates in the formula is great. This metric is important and is something we can consistently track throughout each cohort, but it is difficult to move the metric beyond a certain threshold. Additional funding in the outcome-based formula can help us identify resources and strategies (interventions, ACT preparation materials/tools, etc.) to assist with moving students forward into the category of Ready Graduates.
- 3. Educator salary increases are great to see as well! As school leaders, we are tasked with finding the best teachers to directly impact students. Increasing the base salary does a few things:
  - a. Increases teacher morale
  - b. Assists with recruiting the best teachers
  - c. Assists with retention

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To Whom It May Concern:

The current TISA proposal privileges more affluent districts with ACT incentives. If the current TISA rules are installed, schools and districts with more affluent students will inevitably score higher than 21 on the ACT and the 3 growth points from test 1 to test 2 will not validate growth for all students. A 19 to a 21 on the ACT results in earning the HOPE scholarship, but that growth is not rewarded in the current TISA model. I would suggest leveraging the TVAAS Growth model to incentivize students.

Finally, the Industry Credentials do not articulate to college credits at our TBR and UT colleges, so why are we rewarding schools with additional funding for IC's but not prioritizing the ReadyGrad indicator instead?

Our Governor and his administration need to understand that college is the best path to a thriving career and fulfilling life. College does *not only* mean a 4 year or a community college, but instead includes technology boot camps and apprenticeships with labor unions. If we stop encouraging FAFSA, Drive to 55 and the TN Promise, we will continue to see declines in our college-going rates. The proposed TISA rules suggest that college-going rates are not the priority of the Governor's administration which undermines the nation-leading work of our state around college access and success.

Rewrite the TISA outcomes for high school to create incentives for college-going rates and ReadyGrad over Industry Credentials.
