

Census 2020: Everybody Counts

One thing you can do at home now is fill out your Census form, which you should have received in the mail last week. The uncertainty in the wake of the current pandemic will continue long after the contagion passes. Solid data about where funding for services from highways to health care will be even more needed.



April 1 is officially Census Day. Every household in America can spend a simple, easy 10 minutes to help their community. In mid-March, every home in America was sent an invitation to complete the 2020 Census. Residents can respond online, by phone or by mail. A census is required by the U.S. Constitution every 10 years. The result is a tally of how many people live in the United States, in each state, each county, etc. This information is used to plan for everything from what roads or schools need to be built to how much needs to be budgeted for education or health care. Nonprofits, community planners and policymakers rely on this information, also. The law forbids the release of identifying information from the Census.

You can reply online, on the telephone or by mail. Follow up with people who have not filled out a form will begin with phone calls and continue with home visits when the Census Bureau considers it safe to do so.

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Legislative News

The 111th Tennessee General Assembly passed a barebones budget before recessing until Monday June 1, 2020. The escalating spread of the coronavirus prompted House and Senate leadership to quickly pass a budget that did away with most, if not all of the Governor's proposed budget.

The Legislature approved sunset legislation extending TCCY for four years, although TCCY is required to appear before the Senate Operations Committee when it returns. The budget and other actions included the following.

Recognizing the sudden change to economic circumstances by:

- Lowering our Growth Rate for the current year from 3.75 percent to 2.5 percent
- Revising our FY21 growth rate from 3.1 percent to basically zero
- Adding to our reserves: Rainy day: \$1.2 billion balance at June 30,2020 and \$1.45 billion balance at 6/30/21
- Making an additional \$57M in base reductions

New spending items that include:

- Fully Funding the BEP Formula
- Fully Funding Higher Education outcomes-based funding formula
- Fully funding our Pension contribution
- Fully funding our OPEB Liability contribution
- Fully funding the inflationary growth in TennCare
- Fully funding the growth in DCS children in state services

Adding resources to critical services:

- DL Services
- State Road Troopers (10 Troopers)
- TBI Field Agents (25 agents)

Continuing to address, not defer, the long list of deferred Capital Maintenance items in both state government and higher education

Expanding services for our most vulnerable population

Providing salary funding for state employees, higher education and K12

Responding to the Tornado Disaster and COVID-19 by:

- Adding \$30 million to our Disaster Relief Fund for TEMA
- Adding significantly to our fund for emergencies to repair state buildings
- Establishing a new \$150M fund to help us be responsive to Health and Safety Issues resulting from

COVID-19

- Doubling our Local Government Grants from \$100M to \$200M (no county will receive less than \$500,000 and no municipality will receive less than \$30,000)
- Strengthening our Safety Net for Mental Health and Health




